

IMPORTANT HEALTH NEWS FOR PARENTS AND CARERS: You may have heard on the news about Strep A or Group A Streptococcus. It is a bacteria that can cause illnesses such as Scarlet Fever in young children, often between 2 and 8 years old. It spreads very easily when people cough. Scarlet Fever is usually not serious. It can be treated with antibiotics and children can normally go back to school in 24 hours. But some children can get it worse. If this happens you must tell a health professional or ring 111 for help.

Symptoms of Scarlet Fever include, a sore throat, swollen neck glands - a lump on the side of the neck, a high temperature, after 12 to 48 hours it causes small bumps that feel rough like sandpaper on the tummy and chest, on white skin the rash looks red, on brown or black skin this can be hard to see but you can still feel it. If your child has any of these signs keep them off school and talk to your GP who will tell you if any treatment is needed. Please keep the information flyer that was sent home last week in an easy to access place in your home for reference.
